The Charity's Objectives:

As set out in the Articles of Association, are specifically restricted to the following:

- a. The advancement of education aimed specifically at knowledge and understanding of the beliefs and practices of religious faiths with the purpose of the enhancement of religious and racial harmony within the City of Wolverhampton and its environs.
- b. To develop the capacity and skills of the members of the socially and economically disadvantaged community of Wolverhampton and its environs in such a way that they are better able to identify and help meet their needs and to participate more fully in society by:
- ii. supporting specific projects that are of benefit to the community helping people to take a full role in and participate more fully in society.
- iii. The promotion of sustainable development for the benefit of the public by increasing awareness and knowledge in the area of energy conservation and the protection of the environment through prudent use of natural resources there by assisting in the relief of poverty and the improvement of the condition of life in socially and economically disadvantaged communities.

Performance and Achievement 2020 to 2021

These few years have been challenging for all with the pandemic. Interfaith Wolverhampton has promoted social cohesion to overcome the challenges we face. In these unprecedented times, our method may be different, but the message remains the same

We were not able to gather in our faith communities; For many of us our faith is worked our socially with others in the community. Sacrificing our social gatherings is an act of love for our neighbours as we reduce the risk of the coronavirus spreading and reduce the burden on our NHS and other agencies.

I want to thank all faith institutions for their dedication and commitment; Community Cohesion, Community Togetherness, Communities United as One.

We present here a summary of the main events throughout the year.

Bring and Shares: We continued to hold Bring and Share as Virtual events an outside speaker is invited to share their Faith perspectives.

School Visits: IFW continues to support local schools in delivering broad faiths understanding by organising visits to places of worship and faith presentations in schools when possible.

In 2019 Interfaith annual conference was virtual on Suicide prevention.

In 2020 Interfaith Annual Conference was virtual on Covid 19/ Community Cohesion.

In 2021 Interfaith Annual Conference was face to face at Wolverhampton University on Climate change.

IFW was involved in delivering a Community languages Covid awareness project. This entailed recruiting speakers from 18 different community languages in Wolverhampton, and record key public information messages. These messages were then broadcast on local radio stations, the IFW website and the WCC website. Funding for this work was provided by WCC and this led to a very successful community engagement exercise.

IFW were active in the delivery of another project around, promoting the Covid Vaccines to hard-to-reach communities in Wolverhampton. This project entailed over 20 public meetings, visits to Faith centres, a number of Radio broadcasts and newspaper promotion's Giving out free Sanitation kits and literature to people to stay safe. Staff Board and volunteers were active for over 4 months to ensure the outcomes were met. The project was a great success and IFW were commended by funders for the effective delivery.

Not only did this work bolster our finances, but also allowed us to raise the profile of IFW and promote our mission.

The project also has led to IFW becoming a partner in the Learning Communities Partnership, as organised by the local authority. This is a consortium network that is now embarking on a number of consortium bids to deliver similar projects in the future.

Interfaith Wolverhampton in Partnership with Cllr Greg Brackenridge - Mayor of Wolverhampton - secured and introduced prayers in different faiths at start of full Council meetings. The aim of this initiative is to allow Faith Organisations to access the local authority and to ensure that IFW has a presence at this very influential City forum.

Other Work with Local authority

IFW have forged strong relationships with local Authority and working in collaboration in reviewing our strategies. Each year we work with the council to facilitate a vigil Holocaust Memorial Day and are present as City faith representatives in Remembrance Sunday and Civic Sunday.

Annually we organise social events, home cinema and film show at the Lighthouse to bring everyone together from all faiths and of none.

Financial review

During the year Interfaith Wolverhampton net income was £412 which increased our reserves (unrestricted) to £18,398

The board is mindful of the need to keep expenditure under a tight control and will continue to ensure that we use our income prudently and in line with the objectives of the charity.

Public benefit

Throughout the year the Trustee have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

Future Plans

The board will continue to invest in the regular activities of Interfaith Wolverhampton such as Bring & Share lunches, our schoolwork, public events such as Civic Events, Remembrance Sunday and Holocaust Memorial

Day as well as our annual conference. Work with Wolverhampton City Council and other funders in projects.

All our future work will be shaped around our strategic aims for the forthcoming year.

Conclusion

A new structure to the Board is being developed which is envisaged will allow for swift and more focussed decision making by IFW. This will reduce the number of meetings and give all Board members Officer capacity and responsibility. The aim being to promote the aims and mission of the Organisation with a more assertive approach.

The board is committed to ensure that Interfaith Wolverhampton can continue to utilize our history and experience to help build a peace, harmony, community, cohesion togetherness.

Finally like to take the opportunity to thank the vice chairs, members of the board and the membership for their continued help and support. Our staff Devi Bansal her commitment and professionalism to the work of Interfaith Wolverhampton. Christopher Collins left as Secretary in June 2021 due to a relocation with his work. We thank him for his unstinting work as Secretary, diligent preparation and organisation of meetings and his wise support and advice to colleagues. We wish him well in his new role.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2021

1. Basis of preparation

Basis of Accounting

The Financial Statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in Accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) Accounting and Reporting by Charities (FRS102 version) published in 2014 and applicable accounting Standards.

The company is a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

There have been no changes in accounting policies or in accounting estimates during the year. No material prior year errors have been identified during the year.

Going Concern

The company is substantially dependent on grants and donations for the continuation of its work and the nature of these necessarily means there is some uncertainty about their continued receipt in future years. The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis and the Directors consider that this is appropriate, having regard to expectations of future grants and donations.

Reserves Policy

The Directors' policy is to maintain unrestricted reserves sufficient to cover between 3 and 9 months of expenditure from unrestricted and non-designated funds, together with the potential redundancy costs which would arise in the event that the activities of the company were to be substantially reduced.

Recognition of income

Income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities when the company becomes entitled to the resources, it is more likely than not that the trustees will receive the resources and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability. Revenue grants receivable are credited to the relevant fund in accordance with the general income recognition criteria.

2. Fixed assets and depreciation

All assets have been depreciated to zero. Capital items costing in excess of £500 are capitalised as fixed assets and are depreciated on a straight-line basis over a period of 6 years. No new items in excess of £500 have been purchased in the last 6 years.

3. Donations and legacies

There were no legacies received in 2021 (2020:£nil). Two unrestricted donations of £500 or more were received during the year for £731.41 and £573.00 (2020: one donation of £2311.15).

4. Restricted Funds

Restricted funds of £3,621 were received from Wolverhampton City Council Communities Champions Project (Covid) and £500 from Bilston Round Table (Food distribution project). The Covid project spans two financial years and is in progress, the Food project funding remains unspent and Bilston Round Table will be consulted on what they would like the funds used for.

There are no fixed assets of value.

8. Debtors

Debtors and prepayments at 31 March 2021 relate to Wolverhampton Communities Champions Project (Covid) £3,621 and membership £965. (2020: £812 mainly membership).

9. Creditors

Creditors of £3,770 at 31 March 2021 relates to rent payable - this is made up of £450 Rent and utilities expenditure and the £900 liabilities from 2020, costs to come for Wolverhampton Communities Champions Project £1,920 and fund raising events £500 Bilston.

10. Provisions for liabilities

Provisions for liabilities £1,920 Wolverhampton Communities Champions Project and £500 Bilston Round Table unallocated grant – total £2,420. Since these two liabilities are committed as expenditure for 2021/2022 they are included in the total funds of £20,818 but the unrestricted funds are £2,420 less at £18,398.

11. Employees

In the financial year 2019-20, following the retirement of Mike Shelley-Smith, only one part-time employee was employed from January 2020. In the financial year 2020-21 one part time employee was employed.

12. Trustees' Remuneration and Expenses

No remuneration was paid to any of the Trustees.

Trustees are reimbursed for expenditure they incur in providing services on behalf of the charity. No travel expenses were paid to any of the Trustees during the year ended 31 March 2021 (2019-20 nil). No expenses were due to or from the Trustees at 31 March 2021 or at 31 March 2020. Membership fees and payments for attending IFW events were set at the same rates for Trustees as for third parties.

13. Independent examiner's fees

There were no fees charged by the independent examiner during the year 2020-21 (2019-20 nil)

14. Status of Company

The company's liability is limited by guarantee.
